And she swears she's not kidding. The country and pop hitmaker who's sold more than 85 million records, scored 16 Top 10 Grammy Awards – says

> her current Rock This Country Tour, which kicked off June 5 in Seattle, will be her last major road trip. But she's quick to explain it has nothing to do with age, infirmity or fatigue.

"As much as I'm overdue for the touring, I'm overdue for new music," continues Twain, whose last album, Up!," came out in 2002. "I want to write more. ... I've got a bunch of albums I want to make that have been backed up in my own mind. I've got country singles and won five to get them out of my system and that could take a

while.

"I'm 50 this year (on Aug. 28). I've been on stage since I was 8 years old, and I've really put in my fair share of performance. So I see this as an evolution in my career, really."

"You don't wake up a drug addict. You don't wake up homeless," says Jones, 36, an actor and producer of the proposed TV series "The Inner Circle."

"Telling the stories of the characters and trying to do it in 15 minutes is kind of impossible. ... Let's try to do like a half-hour, let's write it like that," Jones says Williams told him.

While writing the characters Jose and Jonathan (a guilt-ridden minister addicted to prescription drugs, played by Paris Jones), Jones sent the script to his friend, actor Martinez. Martinez loved the script and suggested bringing in his mentor, Mahmud-Bey. Martinez told Jones that Mahmud-Bey would be great playing one of the characters.

So Jones sent the script to Mahmud-Bey, who called it brilliant.
